President's Report



This year, the North Okanagan Hospice Society celebrated twenty five years of service to our community. And we know we have made a difference. Our presence has

opened choices for end-of-life care, in ways not imagined in many parts of our country.

The community has responded with their support of the North Okanagan Hospice Society – not only financially, but also in valuable feedback of how our programs are being received, and in offers of volunteer support. That has continued our tradition, started from the beginning twenty five years ago, of being community based and community driven.

Last year, the Board of Directors, not content to rest on our past successes, began planning the launch of a Community Consultation Task Group to ensure that we continue to honour that tradition. As we envisioned the programme, we thought of a two or three year time line. As we have started to implement it, identifying target groups, and undertaking similar consultations in various geographic areas throughout our

region, we have realized that this is not the short term project we had thought it might be. In fact, we are beginning to believe this may be a continuous programme of staying in touch with the community. Up to now, we have been focussing on senior's groups, and we aren't finished with them. But when we are, we will start consulting with other identifiable groups within our community. At the same time, we won't be waiting to the end of the process to start acting on what we have discovered. Even with the few consultations to date, we are already talking about the implications for our future, in what we are hearing.

Planning for our future, is the work of the Board. Having the staff and other volunteers we work with, makes our task one filled with great potential. Thank you for all you do.

Executive Director's Report



Always striving to meet the need for quality endof-life care in the North Okanagan...

The expansion of Hospice House was completed at

just the right time to meet the growing need for residential end-of-life care. This past year we provided care to 207 individuals and their loved ones from throughout the North Okanagan. This is up from 96 individuals in the year before expansion. For every one person cared for in Hospice House, it is estimated that an additional five loved ones also receive care and support.

Demand for community based bereavement services also continues to grow, with 134 new clients accessing individual counselling services and group programs, an increase of 27 percent over the previous year. Volunteers are involved in all aspects of programming contributing 12,940 hours in service to our clients, an increase of 29 per cent!

North Okanagan Hospice Society continues to have strong financial partnerships in the

delivery of programs and services. Interior Health Authority, our major funding partner for Hospice House, contributes 79 per cent of total revenue required for the program. Residents contribute the minimum residential care rate, mandated by the Ministry of Health at \$29.40 in 2009-2010, representing 8 per cent of total revenue. Generous gifts from donors equal 13 per cent of revenue and ensure that we are able to continue our tradition of excellence in meeting the needs of those we serve.

The Province of British Columbia continues a long-standing financial partnership in the delivery of volunteer and bereavement programs. Gaming grants provide 41 per cent of total revenue with donors contributing the remaining 59 per cent!

The level of philanthropy at North Okanagan Hospice Society ensures that we continue to benefit our clients in the best possible way. All gifts are greatly appreciated and wisely applied to provide quality end-of-life care, today and into the future. As a result of the overwhelming success of our capital campaign to expand

Hospice House, we have established both operating and capital reserve funds, to protect our assets and ensure the delivery of programs and services for generations to come. We are grateful for all contributions of time, talent and financial resources toward the vision of respect, comfort and compassion in life's final journey.

Last but definitely not least I would like to acknowledge and thank my team of staff and volunteers for their outstanding commitment to excellence in achieving quality end-of-life care for those we serve. Together, we truly do make a difference!
